Masculinity

Most New Zealanders think all genders can do anything, but there are still some strong ideas about what boys and men “should” be like.

These ideas hurt all of us. They lead to heavy drinking, poor health and dangerous driving. They create barriers for male survivors of sexual violence to get help. They contribute to men using violence towards women and other genders – from sexual harassment to catcalling to partner violence to rape.

Eight men kill themselves every week in New Zealand. It's time to change these old-fashioned attitudes, for all of us.

The 3Ps describe these strong ideas for how boys and men should behave.

83% of NZers agree that contraception is the responsibility of men and women

"Men who aren't involved in typical blokish kiwi activities such as beer and sports are viewed as inferior by other men."


These ideas hurt all of us, but New Zealanders thought they particularly disadvantaged some groups of men:

The Gender Attitudes Survey 2017 tested where we're at now in New Zealand on gender. Research NZ completed the survey of a nationally representative group of 1251 New Zealanders in terms of age, ethnicity, gender and region. The survey was answered by 640 men. This infographic gives a snapshot of what New Zealanders think about masculinity, including quotes from men who answered the survey.
